Recipes our other sister churches use for Communion within our global mission partners- (World Wide Communion Sunday)

Caribbean Style Banana Bread The fruits found in the warm Caribbean countries are used in this bread. This sweet, flavorful loaf need not be served just for breakfast or snacks, but as an accompaniment to soups and stews. Ingredients: 1/2 cup butter 1/2 cup packed brown sugar 1 egg, well beaten, room temperature 1/4 cup Jamaican rum 1 tsp vanilla extract 1/2 t. soda 1/2 t. salt 3/4 t. ground nutmeg 2 cups un-sifted all-purpose flour 1 1/4 cup very ripe bananas, mashed 1/2 cup walnuts, coarsely chopped 1/2 cup white seedless raisins (optional) 1/2 cup fresh coconut, grated (optional) Directions: 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees

- 2. Cream butter and sugar together, beat in egg until light and fluffy, then stir in rum and vanilla. 3. Sift all dry ingredients, add to the butter mixture, alternating with the mashed banana, mix well after each addition. 4. Fold in the nuts and EITHER coconuts or raisins. 5. Pour into a well buttered and floured loaf pan. 6. Bake for 1 hour and 15 minutes until the bread shrinks from the sides of the pan, and a toothpick comes out clean.
- **7.** Cool for about 30 minutes in the pan, then unmold and completely cool on a rack.

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<u>Pineapple Nut Bread Ingredients:</u> 2 eggs 1/3 cup of sugar 1/3 cup of butter (melted) 2 cups flour 1 T. baking powder 1 t. salt 1 cup nuts (crushed) 1 cup crushed pineapple (canned, including juice <u>Directions:</u> 1. Preheat over to 350 degrees 2. Beat eggs and slowly add sugar until well blended and add melted butter 3. Add 1 cup of crushed nuts and 1 cup of crushed pineapple with juice. Add only enough so that all is incorporated 4. Grease 4x8 inch bread pan. Pour batter into ban and bake for 1 hour and 10 minutes.

LET US BREAK BREAD TOGETHER

On Sunday, October 4th, congregations around the globe will celebrate World Communion Sunday. It is a day when we mark the almost universal Christian practice of breaking bread with one another. World Communion Sunday is a time for remembering that around the globe, in different languages, with different traditions and customs, and in various forms of liturgy, the Eucharist is being celebrated throughout Christendom. Therefore, World Communion Sunday serves two purposes: it is both a joyous and meaningful partaking in Jesus' sacred meal with his friends and a mind-opening exposure to different Christian traditions from around the world that promotes Christian unity and ecumenical cooperation.

"Let Us Break Bread Together" # 330 in The New Century Hymnal, follows the tradition of most Negro spirituals in its simplicity in both words and tune. This song is mainly used during communion services, and reminds us of our spiritual food and drink presented through the bread and wine/juice during Holy Communion. Growing up in a Missouri Synod Lutheran Church, we took the Lord's Supper up front kneeling at the Communion railing sharing the bond of fellowship with those in our community of faith. "Let Us Break Bread Together" is a song about that fellowship of sharing bread together.

As I thought about the words and the haunting music, I found myself drawn to the history of the African-American Spiritual and how it speaks to our communities, our friendships, and our fellowship. The history of "Let Us Break Bread Together" is uncertain. As with many spirituals created by slaves in the 18th and 19th centuries, this one was passed on orally, and its origin has been lost to us. We can only speculate as to what the song means as is the case with many hymns in that tradition. Negro spirituals were mostly composed by black American slaves with no training in music. Some believe that the slaves simply added words to African traditional folk tunes they had left behind in Africa.

These songs were composed by communities of enslaved African Americans in the years between 1830 and 1860 in the rural South. They are songs with mainly biblical themes that express meaningful thoughts, desires, emotions, and reflections on the situation of people in bondage.

There is a theory that the earliest version of "Let Us Break Bread Together" probably began with the current stanza three, and was a song of some of the enslaved in Virginia used when gathering for secret meetings. It's believed that the verses that relate to the Lord's Supper were added after the Civil War making it suitable for use on that occasion.

As to the significance of "the rising sun" in the song, some have suggested it symbolizes a search for spiritual light. Others have suggested it might indicate the longing and hope for a new day of freedom to dawn.

Beyond what is known and surmised about the hymn, we can see it as a passionate call to fellowship for God's people. "Let Us Break Bread Together" calls Christians together in celebration of the Lord's Supper. Whether we kneel, sit, or stand, the attitude of the heart is worship as we come before Christ, the host of the feast.

Twenty years ago, my friends and former Jackson neighbors gathered to celebrate my 70th birthday. I was presented with a copy of You're Only Old Once! - A Book for Obsolete Children by Dr. Seuss. Am I older, aged, ancient, or, perhaps in paraphrased words of Dr. Seuss; an "Obsolete Child"? Life isn't about waiting for the storm to pass—it's about learning to dance in the rain.



One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. Neighbors in Need grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities. These grants fund projects whose work ranges from direct service to community organizing and advocacy to address systemic injustice. This year, special consideration will be given to projects focusing on serving our immigrant neighbors and communities.

World Communion Sunday is a celebration observed by several Christian denominations, taking place on the first Sunday of every October, that promotes Christian unity and ecumenical cooperation. It focuses on an observance of the eucharist. The tradition was begun in 1933 by Hugh Thomson Kerr who ministered in the Shadyside Presbyterian Church. According to Presbyterian Outlook:

Davitt S. Bell (the late Clerk of Session and church historian at Shadyside) recalled that Dr. Kerr first conceived the notion of World Communion Sunday during his year as moderator of the General Assembly (1930). Dr. Kerr's younger son, the Rev. Dr. Donald Craig Kerr, who is pastor emeritus of the Roland Park Presbyterian Church in Baltimore, was sixteen in 1933. He has related that World Communion Sunday grew out of the Division of Stewardship at Shadyside. It was their attempt to bring churches together in a service of Christian unity—in which everyone might receive both inspiration and information, and above all, to know how important the Church of Jesus Christ is, and how each congregation is interconnected one with another. It was then adopted throughout the <u>US Presbyterian Church</u> in 1936^[1] and subsequently spread to other denominations. In 1940, the <u>Federal Council of Churches</u> (now the <u>National Council of Churches</u>), led by <u>Jesse Moren Bader</u>, endorsed World Communion Sunday and began to promote it to Christian churches worldwide. 
